#### TOWARDS A GREATER FELLOWSHIP!

the everlasting arms." What congregation has not sung this familiar hymn, often at the end of the worship experience or of the Sacrament of Holy Communion? If it is like one church, I know of, when the congregation gets to the refrain, "leaning, leaning," the masses jovially sway to the

words and music. Here is the question though: would we sing this song at a non-church event, such as a graduation or a banquet? Can you imagine replacing the National Anthem with it and seeing all the fans lean to the right and then to the left? After all, the use of the hymn points to group camaraderie and esprit de corps. Uh, I don't

Let us first think of things in terms of categories, for, simply speaking, almost everything has different types or varieties of itself. For example, one can buy green beans (or string beans) whole, cut, or French style. There is ice cream that comes in vanilla, chocolate and strawberry flavors; but even they have their own varieties, such as homemade vanilla or French vanilla or Neapolitan if all three flavors come together. Moreover, we do not just buy a car; we buy a certain kind of car as we would buy a certain kind of television or wear a certain type of hair style. Even the virus of the pandemic comes in varieties or strains. And let us not forget the Holy Bible. Some of us have, of course, the King James Version; but there is also the New International Version, among others. Yes, things have their own varieties of themselves, and we pick and choose varieties that best suit our wants, purposes, and needs. So it is with fellowship, which comes in more than one format and goes beyond a gathering of people who mingle around a certain cause. Yet, for us believers, our fellowship is built around one main divine principle although we may exercise that principle in different ways. When we think of **fellowship**, we often think of it from a social construct; that is, we see it as a gathering of people who are mingling, conversing, perhaps eating.

As churchgoers we see it as a time to gather and communicate socially the love of God among his people; so, when we pass the peace and sing "What a Fellowship" or give the right hand of fellowship, we are being social, using social constructs like hugging and shaking hands. However, there is more to **fellowship** than hugging and kissing while passing the peace. In fact, I want to suggest that because we are disciples of Christ, our fellowship should lean more toward the spiritual construct than to the social construct; that is to say, fellowship at its core ought to plant the seeds of evangelism, ultimately leading to greater discipleship. We first plant the seeds of evangelism by reading the Bible (any version), which is our tool for developing **fellowship**. There are scriptural references that point to a joyful, loving fellowship as a means to a healthy Christian community of believers, or it could be said that a healthy Christian community of believers is the means to a joyful, loving fellowship. For example, John, the apostle of love, writes about having **fellowship** with other believers. "We proclaim to you what we have seen and heard, so that you also may have fellowship with us. Moreover, our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son, Jesus Christ. We write this to make our joy complete" (1 John 1:3-4, NIV). I use the term "a community of Christian believers" because it is clear from the scriptures that true fellowship occurs among believers. "Do not be voked together with unbelievers. For what do righteousness and wickedness have in common? Or what **fellowship** can light have with darkness?" (2 Corinthians 6:14, NIV). For us, then, there is only one kind of **fellowship** and that is the **fellowship** that puts us in communion with God although we may commune in different ways. So, a house party is a gathering; it is not **fellowship**. A sports game is a gathering; it is not fellowship. Even a Lay Council meeting is a Lay Council meeting and not fellowship, unless, of course, part of it is given to fellowship if those gathered invoke and express fellowship with the Holy Spirit. We also plant the seeds of **fellowship** through evangelism. It is clear from the Class Meeting system of John Wesley and the Class Leader


system of James Varick and the Zionists that **fellowship** is an essential part of evangelism. I am reminded of a stanza in the hymn, "Bless Be the Tie That Binds," for it is in **fellowship** that "we share our mutual woes, our mutual burdens bear." Echoing both of these bishops, **fellowship** is the seat of <u>conversion</u>. Wesley did not design the **fellowship** of the Class Meeting to be a collection pool for assessments and dues. He said that the testimonies and narratives of faith of the people in the small groups were more impressive than the reported numbers of the crowds that assembled for open-air sermons.


In this way, <u>fellowship</u> helps to provide <u>spiritual edification</u>. In a recent Lay Academy, Mrs. Katherine S. Burrell, Regional Lay Council President of Mid-Atlantic and President of the Philadelphia and Baltimore Conference emphasized that in the process of **fellowship**, sheep are feeding sheep. "By feeding [God's] sheep, we not only **fellowship** with each other but we, more importantly, also serve others through evangelism. As laity, 'our calling or vocation is to witness in Word, deed and presence to the tidings of salvation,' for we are called to reach out to others to 'Come with Us to Christ.'"

Finally, we also plant the seeds of **fellowship** when we commune one with another in the name of Jesus. "Again, I tell you that if two of you on earth agree about anything you ask for, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three come together in my name, there am I with them" (Matthew 18:19-20, NIV). I have said before that **fellowship**, like most other things, comes in different forms so that there can be **fellowship** with two as there can be with two hundred. You and your prayer partner can fellowship if you are communing with God; but if you start talking about the politics of the day, you have moved out of **fellowship**. Likewise, if there is a Trustee Board meeting, part of it can be devoted to **fellowship** before the meeting resumes. Hence, we can **fellowship** for an hour; we can **fellowship** for ten minutes. Does it appear that I am suggesting that we can move in and out of **fellowship**?

Perhaps I am. If we, for example, are in a meeting and someone says, "Let us pray," it is the same as saying, "Let us **fellowship**." If a group of people are together without invoking the presence of God, they are not in **fellowship**. "And our **fellowship** is with the Father and with his Son, Jesus Christ" (1 John 1:3, NIV). So, a **fellowship** dinner, then, is not a **fellowship** if the diners are just eating and talking and laughing—at least not in the spiritual construct.

Indeed, reading God's Word develops our potential for greater **fellowship** when we engage in evangelism and commune with others. Yet, there is another kind of **fellowship**— perhaps the most significant. That is, although we **fellowship** one with another, there is no **fellowship** like a personal fellowship with God—just you and God. How magnificent it is when we go to our prayer room and find ourselves in communion with Him, where "prayer is the soul's sincere desire, unuttered or unexpressed, the motion of a hidden fire that trembles in the breast." In this way, we build a greater relationship with Him so that we are empowered to strengthen our **fellowship** with others and work towards sharing our faith as we continue to "mature believers and make disciples" in the **Fellowship of the Holy Spirit**.



Three days before the 2020 General Election, the Washington District, under the leadership of Presiding Elder Alvin T. Durant, found itself meeting virtually in a collaborative effort to educate voters about historical and present-day voter suppression. The Lay Academy was the results of months of collaborative planning by the District's Voter Registration Committee, the District's Lay Council and the Union Wesley AME Zion Church's Lay Council. The Academy was hosted by the Union Wesley AME Zion Church in Washington, DC, which is pastored by The Rev. Dr. Brian S. Relford, Sr.

Mrs. Yvonne Baskerville, Lay Council President at Union Wesley, welcomed Washington District's members and friends to the Lay Academy. The Rev. Dr. Clarence Cross, Co-Director of the District's Voter Registration Committee blessed us with the opening prayer. The prayer was followed by welcoming remarks from the host pastor and the Presiding Elder. Mr. Gilbert Turner, District Lay Council President, introduced the speaker for the first part of our Academy, The Rev. William H. Lamar IV, pastor of the Metropolitan African Methodist Episcopal Church in Washington, DC.

Rev. Lamar greeted the District and succinctly laid the framework for what proved to be an inspiring message on voter suppression. His message was thought provoking, impactful and grounded in sound scriptural and historical research. Each slide took us to school on many levels; speaking to our seniors, young adults and even about those not yet born. The audience listened intently as Rev. Lamar stated, unapologetically, that the objectives of our current governmental structure has accomplished exactly what was intended; to limit the democracy that our people had dreamed about and continue to struggle for. Rev. Lamar's rousing presentation concluded with a period of questions and answers.

Following a health break, the second portion of our Academy was introduced by The Rev. Dr. Michelle Searles, Co-Director, AME Zion CED Varick's Children Ministry, which was the viewing of the award-winning documentary, "Let My People Vote." This documentary is the story of one man, Mr. Desmond Meade, trying to get voting rights restored for all people, especially citizens returning to our society after being incarcerated. Filmed in Tampa, Florida, 2 days before the 2016 presidential election, this short film covered a day-in-the-lives of civil right activists, Mr. Meade and Mr. Marquis McKenzie, going door-to-door registering people to vote. What began as an upbeat day of faith in our democratic process, for them, ends with a heartbreaking realization that racist voter suppressive practices still exist. At the conclusion of the film, the producer, Ms. Gilda Brasch and Mr. McKenzie thanked the Washington District for its interest in the voter registration struggle. They were eager to answer our questions and provide additional information on the ongoing work against voter suppression. At the conclusion of our time together, their forthright responses to our questions and comments confirmed our beliefs that the struggles of discrimination and racial bias would still be with us long after the votes of the election are counted. We cannot be complacent. Our work is not finished!

"COVID Connect: A Conversation with Healthcare Providers"

"We are our Brothers and Sisters' Keepers." The Pee Dee 'Conference Lay Council and Christian Education Department answered the call to enhance the education of the community on the COVID-19 Virus, which has led to a global pandemic. The

seminar, "COVID Connect: A Conversation with Healthcare Providers", was developed and facilitated by Ms. Verta W. Looper, President, Pee Dee Conference Lay Council and Ms. Brenda W. Chisholm, Director, Pee Dee Conference Christian Education Department.

On January 31, 2021, via Zoom virtual platform, health care providers and others provided critical encouraging facts. Dr. Kharia J. Holmes, M.D., board certified internal medicine physician, addressed "A Critical Decision: Taking the COVID-19 Vaccine." She presented data of Lancaster, S.C. County: 77 new daily cases are occurring in Lancaster County, 30.59% have been fully vaccinated which is lower than several S.C. counties, and minorities are being vaccinated at a lower rate than whites. She emphasized that minorities are disproportionately dying from the virus. Therefore, it is critical to agree to be vaccinated. Dr. Holmes replaced Dr. Kristin S. Black, M.D., board certified in family medicine, as a panelist, who tested positive for the virus during the week. Dr. Black earlier stated that she can understand the hesitancy, given some of the past medical discrimination and exploitation of some minorities. However, it is critical to get the vaccine. It was, also, highlighted that Dr. Kizzmekia Corbett, a hard working African American female scientist participated in the development of the vaccine. Dr. Xaviera Maya Carter, M.D., a board certified obstetrician-gynecologist, discussed "Pregnancy and the Vaccine." She encouraged pregnant and imminent pregnant women to discuss with their physicians the pros and cons. Dr. Carter concluded with her personal story of testing positive recently, although, she had received the first dose of the vaccine. She stressed the importance of the vaccine, which will reportedly lead to milder symptoms, if one contracts the vaccine. The last presenter was Ms. Ashley Shannon, Marketing and Community Relations Director, MUSC, Lancaster and Chester Hospitals. She informed the audience on "How Can I Get the Vaccine?" On February 1st, MUSC will be offering a new call center to assist with scheduling, 843-876-7227. DHEC's Care Line is 855-472-3432. MUSC Health Lancaster Medical Center and Primary Care Lancaster Medical are MUSC current Lancaster providers for the vaccine, but more providers are quickly receiving approval. McLeod Health Center, 843-577-7881 is one location that is offering the vaccine in the Cheraw, S.C. area and Care South, 843-623-5080, in Chesterfield, S.C. Following Ms. Shannon were two peers, Mr. Odell Witherspoon, Jr, Steele Hill AME Zion Church and Mr. James Witherspoon,

White Oak AME Zion Church, who shared, "I Said Yes to the Vaccine." Mr. Odell reported that he believed in the science of the vaccine and had received his first dose in Charlotte, N.C. Mr. James reported that he definitely took the vaccine in Lancaster because of current health issues, including prostate cancer. Neither has experienced adverse side effects.

Many attendees were recognized for already taking the vaccine and having scheduled appointments. Questions were answered, and the seminar concluded with attendees receiving a plethora of information from diverse presentations, which, also, provided encouragement. The providers reminded the audience that we must maintain CDC preventive measures. After both doses of the current vaccines, there is still a 5% possibility of contracting the virus. Assistance to schedule an appointment was offered after the seminar for anyone who needed it. The facilitators are very appreciative of everyone's participation and support.
