

2020 Lay Convocation Schedule (this is a tentative schedule)





The Connectional Lay Council is committed to supporting a cause or responding to a community need to agencies or organizations in the city or county where the Connectional Lay Council Quadrennial meetings are held. The 11th Quadrennial Lay Convocation will convene March 19th -21st in the city of Fayetteville, North Carolina where the Eastern North Carolina Episcopal District will be our host. The CLC will partner with the Child Advocacy Center who serves to protect children from child abuse. The Center is a 501c3 charitable organization who relies on generous donations to fund their program. The organization was founded in 1993 by a group of professionals

seeking to coordinate services provided to child abuse victims and their families. The CAC provides safe and child-friendly environment where 19 community agencies come together to interview, investigate and provide support to sexually or physically abused children and their families. In the 2017 fiscal year, the center served 696 families and in 2018 fiscal year 686 families received services. The CAC "Darkness to Light Training" educates parents, grandparents, and everyone who works with children on how to recognize, prevent and react responsively to child sexual abuse. The CAC also provides "Recognizing and Reporting Child Abuse Training" for professionals and organizations on how to recognize signs of child abuse and how to report suspicions of child abuse. 

Public Relations for Clergy and Lay Leaders in the Local Church

While many would like to deny it as the fact relates to their own denomination, it is a well-documented fact that "mainline Protestant" denominational churches, of which the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church is one, have experienced decline in membership and attendance during the last 50 years. In a 2017 article of the Washington Post predicted that if these churches continued their present trajectory, they would cease to exist in 23 years.

Rather than wring our hands about a phenomenon we see manifested every Sunday with more and more empty pews, we should try to do something about the problem—if we think we have something to offer the world. As an anxious observer who thinks we have a lot to offer anxious and unfilled people in a stress-producing world, I suggest this: let's start acting like what we purport to be: **the church!**

For the purpose of this discussion, I am using this definition of church to provide focus: A local church is a gathering of believers who wish to develop and sustain their faith in God through their belief in the Christ as God incarnate, and who seek to develop the character of Christ as enabled by the Holy Spirit so that they bring others to the salvific wonder of a relationship with the true and living God. That definition may take a little thought, but the underlying assumptions are these: that we who are in the church---

(1) are in the church because we believe in the truth of Christ, and want to follow His teachings and be like Him;

(2) believe that the truth of Christ can sustain us to live victoriously

(3) believe that a relationship with God is found through belief in the Christ as the absolute leader (Lord) in our lives;

(4) belief in Christ awakens within us the Holy Spirit, the felt presence of God within us, who guides and comforts us for victorious living;

(5) know that worldly achievement and pleasures are a poor substitute for the fulfillment found in a relationship with God.

All of the above assumes that we accept one of the essential truths that Jesus so elegantly taught: "You can't worship two gods at once. Loving one god, you'll end up hating the other. Adoration of one feeds contempt for the other." Matthew 6:24 MSG

So if we believe all the foregoing, are we as clergy and lay leaders communicating these beliefs to our publics?

Or are communicating something else? We as clergy and lay leaders in fact control the week-to-week, yearto-year practices and processes in a local church and therefore must assume responsibility for the outcomes. Are we driving the people away by being a lot of things but not a **church**?

Let's consider our challenge of being a true church that attracts people from a public relations perspective. We have two publics: the internal ones—those who are sitting in the pews...at least on some Sundays. The second are those who do not come to our church but hear about what we are doing. There are at least two areas of consideration when we evaluate our public relations with our internal publics, the people who sit in the pews on Sunday; and there are also at least two considerations related to our external publics.

Internal Public Relations

(1) Does the worship hour in our church focus on the wonder of God, the saving grace of Christ, and the redemptive and guiding presence of the Holy Spirit? Or do we communicate greater concern about politics and government, history and culture, the world of materialism, success, secular education, societal acceptance and participation, health and wellness, and even acquisition of power and position by using time on these matters?

Perhaps some of the matters other that worship merit some attention by the church using other settings but not during the worship hour. Besides, much of what interrupts worship is not effective at all for informing or teaching because of the large group setting—it is what it is: an interruption! People do not come to worship to learn about politics, history, or culture, or even health or wellness; they come for to fulfill the needs of the soul and only time focused on God and guided by the Holy Spirit can do that.

(2) Is our worship of God a corporate experience where all actively participate? Is there a message for all, including the children and youth? Or is this hour a performance by the preacher and the choir? Preaching must teach the doctrine of Christian living. If it only excites the emotions with rhythmic cadence and response but is empty of substantive teaching, it will not fulfill the needs of our souls—even for those of us who shout and dance in response. Moreover, the choir has no responsibility to entertain. Its purpose is to provide encouragement and support for the congregation to sing to the glory of God, learn the way of the Christ, and experience the presence of the Holy Spirit.

It is my prayer that every Zionite, along with their families, friends, and organizations, take time to view the biopic "Harriet" that is playing in local theaters. For those who have already viewed it - I say thank you for celebrating "The Moses of Our People". Because of Harriet's continued love for God, church and family she entrusted her property (as a free

woman) to the church that she so loved - the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church in Auburn, New York.

In viewing the film we must be ever so vigilant to separate fact from artistic freedom. Thus, it is extremely important that we know her history for ourselves and pass it on to our youth. We must also be mindful that the film was based on the enslaved Harriet Tubman but our property represents the "Free Harriet".

Cynthia Erivo's, original song "Stand Up" was co-written by our own Zionite Joshuah Brian Campbell. This is the inspirational song you hear during the end credits.

For over 46 years there has been an annual pilgrimage to celebrate her contributions commencing at her gravesite and then traveling up the street to her home. Over the years, the numbers have grown and the celebration had to be housed in a larger venue. Yet, since the property has become a National Park, there are park rangers available for the tour following the program. During the year if anyone wishes to tour, Rev. Paul G. Carter and his wife, Christine, have been committed caretakers and have done tour guides for 29 years, now assisted by the park rangers.

For those who have not attended our pilgrimages please make time to join us in Auburn, New York on May 29-30, 2020. Not only will you be blessed by placing your feet on hallowed grounds but you will also meet Harriet's family who still reside in Auburn and attend the ceremony every year. The Board is feverishly making plans to make this event a fruitful experience that you will always cherish.

In 2017, President of Connectional Lay Council, Mary Matthews, took on a personal initiative to raise a \$50,000 offering to contribute to the work of the Harriet Tubman Home. As a result Mary made a monetary presentation (\$52,000) to Bishop Dennis V. Proctor, Presiding Prelate and the Harriet Tubman Board, Inc. that represented the Piedmont District Episcopal District (Bishop George E. Battle) all the way to the Eastern West African Episcopal District (Bishop Uduak Effiong). They all joined hands together on Connectional Lay Sunday (honoring Harriet Tubman) to make the contribution to the Harriet Tubman Home.

Looking towards 2020, we were enthusiastic in anticipation for Harriet's face to be imprinted on the \$20.00 bill but because of #45 in the White House, that has been postponed for circulation until 2028.

We were truly saddened by the passing of U.S. Rep Elijah Cummings (D, MD-7) who along with– U.S. Rep. John Katko (R, NY-24) were recipients of the Harriet Tubman Quest for Freedom Award in 2018. On February 7, 2019 they re-introduced The Harriet Tubman Tribute Act, bipartisan legislation that directs the Secretary of the Treasury to place the likeness of Harriet Tubman on \$20 Federal Reserve notes printed after December 31, 2020.

Please be reminded that all of our churches should be recognizing Connectional Harriet Tubman Day the second Sunday in March each year. The monies collected on that date are not for your local churches but are to be forwarded to the Harriet Tubman Board, Inc. for the upkeep of "our property".

(1) What do we advertise in the public domain with flyers, radio announcements, and social media? Do we communicate our ministries of worship, ageappropriate Christian education, growth-encouraging means of fellowship, outreach and benevolence? Or do we primarily advertise only fundraisers, parties (called by whatever name), and entertainment events guised as worship?

(2) How do we attend to the communications that people who hear about us receive? People talk around and to their family, friends, and co-workers about our church. What are we doing to assure that our internal publics are included in both information and activities about our church? Are all given information presented in an understandable fashion and invited to all activities? Is written information (bulletins, etc.) attractive and informative? Are all made to feel welcomes and invited to all aspects of church life? What are we doing to make sure all **know** they are welcome? Our internal publics are the main means of communication with external publics, so we should treat everyone with care! "And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love." 1 Corinthians 13:13 NRSV But we must remember, love is an action verb!

In summary, the Church has something to offer-everything in a sense. But we must be the real thing-not purporting to be something that we'll not. If we are the real thing, God will do the rest. People need God, and a lot of people know they need God. But they need somewhere to feel God's presence. It's not easy to do so in our individualistic, materialistic, noisy, busy, loud and hurry-up world. The church should be that respite from our world, which wearies our souls to distraction. But this requires us as clergy and lay leaders to be focused—to think about what we are doing and what we are saying by our actions. It is easy to bring all the cares of the world into the church at every turn. But let us not be beguiled by Satan. He is not red and ugly. Satan is beautiful, tasty, seemingly fun, entertaining—but oh! Satan's beauty is only skin-deep, the fun so short-lived, the entertainment exhausting and often dangerous, and so unfulfilling! Isn't it worth our dedication and commitment to set ourselves apart so that we can be the real thing?

Reverend Marshall opened the academy with a prayer followed by requesting us to locate the scripture Ephesians 6:10-18 in the Bible. As Reverend Marshall began the academy she explained that she was not sure of what the Board of Lay Activities does once she was appointed as Chairperson for the

Board. She understood that there were clergy and laypersons and without the laypersons it would be impossible for the clergy to function. She proceeded to discuss with the academy attendees the following questions for response from all. 1."What is it a Lay person does being a member of the Lay Council. We cannot retool something that is already tooled. So what is it we do?" 2. "Is what we are doing helping us to understand what it is we are suppose to do as lay people?" 3. Is everyone who is in attendance the local church lay person in his or her church and what sets us apart from the regular lay person? 4. Is paying the \$5.00 for membership and carrying the little black card is that all there is in being part of the Lay Council? 5. What makes it different from the other organizations? We need to have clear understanding of what we are to do as Lay people. This is why we are here today attending the Lay Academy. She continued to explain that there are lay persons that barely attend church and definitely don't know what's going on in the bigger church. It is our responsibility to disseminate information to let the lay people know how powerful they are and that they do have a voice and the pastor's voice is not the only voice.

We are to let people know that we have spirituality. There are people who can touch other people they can help persons in the church for understanding of the sermon. Some church members who did not and cannot explain what the sermon was about because it went over their head and never got anywhere else above the sermon.

If we speak with

them they might get a better understanding of what the pastor has said. There are people we can touch just because they like us. They may not like someone else who has a lot of information and will not speak with them. If we know we have that kind of feel and know you have that kind of reach we need to touch those people. There are people that will talk to us but not to anyone else. There are people who might not want the Pastor to pray for them because they don't want the pastor to know where they are not, also that they might not be as strong as they pretend to be. They might have fallen off this week that is our cue to say, "Let's pray". An ordinary member might be able to do it but we as the Lay person have an added responsibility to the Laity. There are those who don't attend church and need to know what is going on in their church. Then there are people in the church who do not know what to do and have no investment in the church. They think that putting their \$5.00 in and going to prayer meeting once a month makes them a good member. It is up to us to explain what makes a good member. The Lay Council person has an added responsibility to the Laity as well as to inform the Pastor about something in reference to a member in the church (sick, death, hospitalized). We are to attend our meetings and take the information back to the church also take seriously the job we have. The question was asked, "What is the difference between Christian Education and the Missionaries who are also to disseminate information"? Reverend Marshall explained that every local church might not have a particular organization. Every local church is not run the same way because every pas-

tor is different. She pays the \$5.00 for every member of her church to be apart of the Lay Organization. In other churches members have to give their \$5.00. The bottom line is that we want all persons of the Laity to be a part of the Lay Organization. In the big picture The Christian Education department is the teaching arm of the church. They are the teaching arms to let everyone



know that there is a Lay Council, also other organizations. There is a big arm and under that arm are other organizations. In some churches there is the Lav Council but all churches should have a Class Leaders system. The class leaders are mini pastors. There is enough information about the church

and life that you can be taught in each organizations and never get the same information because there is so much to learn and know. The Lay Organization let's the Laity know what's happening with the Laity all through out the denomination. The definite information we all can share is the Good News, Jesus saves and Jesus satisfies. We are to give people a sense to know that they are part of the big picture. There are things going on outside of the local church and we are to share the information also encourage them to attend. (Quarterly Conference, Lay Academy, District Conference, Annual Conference) they might not want to go and want to know where the money is going and not realize they are missing information by not attending. We should have that information to share. We are to be encouragers but we cannot encourage others if we do not believe it or doing it ourselves. We have people who are very unhappy with the church and will say so in complaints. We are to disseminate information that will keep the church healthy and for it to be the best it can be. To be a good Christian you have to be spiritual. It also takes spirituality to hold an office. Anyone can make excuses for what they don't want to do. It is time for us to stop making excuses because our church is failing; our denomination is failing because we are making to many excuses as ministry and as lay people. Reverend Marshall referred to the scripture "The Whole Armor Of God" In the church the devil will try to get in the mist of what your trying to build or put together that is his job if no one else in the church is doing their job he is. She referred to Paul's statement in scripture

as to put on the Whole Armor of God that we may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. There might be times when you try your best that's when the devil will put a target on your back. He will try to divide the people. We have to be prepared that when we take on this responsibility to be a disseminator of truth and pull people together the devil will work against what we are try to build. God has not provided a partial set of weapons before us he has provided a complete set. He has given us the Whole Armor we are the ones who don't use it. We go into battle unprepared for battle of the apposing forces in the church (the pulpit, the pew, and the choir, etc.). The discussion continued with Reverend Marshall having us to identify each piece of the armor and state it's purpose. We as Lay people who God has called need to be prepared in complete dress in the Whole Armor of God to feel powerful to go up against the evil forces that is put before us so that we can accomplish and complete the work God.



The focus of our 2019 retreat was to bring to life this year's portion of the quadrennial theme, Retooling our People, through a four-part program: praying with love, caring for loved ones, embodying change in our spiritual leadership and local outreach.

Praying with Love

Our Meditation Speaker, Rev. Bessie Lucas, called upon us to retool our practices with love. She encouraged us to bring a loving spirit to prayer. She reminded us that to live as God expects us to we must love him, ourselves and our neighbors.

Caring for Loved Ones

Embodying Change in our Spiritual Leadership

Our International President, Dr. Mary J Matthews, gave the Lay Academy workshop "Retooling the Leader in Me: Be the Change you want to see"

Dr. Matthews shared key leadership principles and how to best leverage them within a spiritual context. She shared George Barna's definition that a Christian leader is someone who is called by God to lead; leads with and through Christ like character; and demonstrates the functional competencies that permit effective leadership to take place. Her message on leadership as given by Jesus came from Matthew 20:25-28, to be a leader you must be a servant to others. She connected these principles to those of Dr. Stephen R. Covey, we must be proactive not reactive. In summary, spiritual leadership should focus on influencing people towards God's agenda in our church, community and family. When we give our life in service to others we should be proactive, begin with the end in mind, put first things first, think win-win, and first understand, then be understood.

Dr. Matthews inspired us to foster change by first changing ourselves and embodying the change we strive for within our own spiritual leadership within the church. For example, the leader who wants to inspire kindness must first extend kindness in his/her own practices and interactions as an inspiration and example to others. We must be the change we want to see.
